

History

- Department of Public Health, Dental Services began the school based sealant program in 1996 in 3 schools
- Annually serves 12–14 SFUSD elementary schools and one middle school
- In 2017/18 provided sealants to 800 students

Problem: Tooth Decay



- Most common chronic childhood disease
- 100% preventable
- Affects overall health and development
- More missed days of school, lower academic achievement
- High costs hospital dentistry, ER visits, schools miss funding when children are absent, parents miss work to take child to the dentist
- Disparities between children of color and white children

Why and what are sealants?



The first permanent molar is the most frequently decayed tooth. It has many cracks and crevices for bacteria to hide.



Sealants are a resin which is painted on to the biting surfaces of teeth to seal out those bacteria.




It is cured with a light a becomes very hard.

Ideal time for sealants to be placed

On newly erupted molars before they have a opportunity to decay.

- Ages 6-8 years old for the first permanent molars
 Ages 9-12 years old for the second permanent molars
 Kids this age may not go to the dentist but they are in school

Current School-Based Sealant Program




